The Texas A&M-Kingsville beach volleyball team will begin its first season Friday and Saturday when it hosts the Newman Hall Beach Volleyball Invitational Tournament on the new courts at the northwest corner of the campus.

The six courts are in the new athletic/intramural complex.

Eight matches are scheduled in the two days.

In Friday's first matchups, the Javelinas will meet Stevenson (Md.) at 3 p.m., Principia (Ill.) and Missouri Baptist meet at 4 p.m. The Javelinas play Principia at 6 p.m. and Stevenson (Md.) meets Missouri Baptist at 7 p.m.

Tarleton State was 13-5 in the LSC, West Texas finished 12-6, the Javelinas tied with Texas A&M-Commerce and Cameron for

fourth, each with 10-8 records. Angelo State, Midwestern State and Eastern New Mexico tied for seventh with 7-11 records and Western New Mexico, also in its first season of LSC play, didn't win a league contest in 18 games.

In the women's standings, Eastern and Angelo State tied for the lead with 16-4 records. West Texas A&M was third at 15-5, Texas A&M-Commerce was fourth at 14-6, Tarleton State fifth with an 11-9 record, Cameron 9-11 in

they meet in the opening round of the LSC Championships in Allen. Eastern is seeded No. 1 in the meet.

THE JAVELINA BEACH volleyball team, which opens its inaugural season Friday and Saturday on campus, will be facing some of the nation's top-ranked squads this spring.

The American Volleyball Coaches Association released its preseason poll last week and five of the teams in the top 15 are on the Javelina schedule.

Arizona is ranked No. 6 and the Javelinas play the Wildcats March 11 in Tempe, Ariz.

Georgia State is No. 8 and the Javelinas take on the squad April 15 in Baton Rouge, La.

Louisiana State is No. 10 and the Javelinas will face the Tigers April 14 in Baton Rouge.

Grand Canyon (Ariz.) is ranked No. 12 and the Javelinas will play the squad Wednesday in Phoenix, Ariz.

Tulane is No. 15 and the Javelinas will play the Green Wave April 7 in Houston.

Arizona State received votes in the poll and is on the Javelina schedule for a March 11 match in Tempe.

THE TARLETON STATE athletic department chartered a bus to the Texans' games with Texas-Permian Basin in Odessa last week, and there was no charge for the trip.

The first 48 fans who signed up were given seats on the charter. The department also offered free tickets to the game.

UTPB beat the Texans to pull into a tie for the men's lead, and then downed Texas A&M-Commerce Saturday while TSU lost to West Texas A&M, giving the Falcons the conference championship in their first season in the league.

NCAA DIVISION II athletic administrators are looking at the model for bracketing Division II championships to enhance the experience for teams playing in early tournament rounds.

The focus is on reducing the number of in-conference opponents that meet in the first round of team sport championship tournaments.

One model would allow certain seeds to be adjusted to avoid a first-round conference matchup. The regional advisory committees for each sport would continue to recommend the order of teams for rankings and selections and national sport committees would then have the flexibility to make small bracket adjustments as needed.

A model would protect the No. 1 and No. 2 seeds and allow adjustments for the No. 3-7 seeds only.

There has been concern about the frequency at which teams from the same conference meet in early rounds of a team-sport championship tournament. Such matchups decrease the championship experience for those teams that have already played multiple times in a season.

Data from the past five years shows that conference matchups in the first round occur about one-third of the time.

The award was presented by the Texas Regional Chapter of the ACSM.

She is the third consecutive student from TAMUK to receive the award and the fifth ever.

The Texas ACSM chapter is one of 12 regional chapters in the ACSM, the largest exercise science and sports medicine professional society in the world. It has more than 50,000 members who dedicate themselves to advancing and integrating scientific research to provide educational and practical applications of the exercise sciences and sports medicines.

Cantu, from Monte Alto (Edcouch-Elsa), is a three-year letterwinner with the golf team. She is an exercise science and pre-physical therapy major.

She is the department of health and kinesiology exercise science major of the year and will be entering the doctor of physical therapy program at Texas Woman's University-Houston next fall.

BIRMINGHAM, ALA., WILL host an NCAA Division II National Championships Festival March 7-11.

More than 1,000 athletes are expected to compete in the five NCAA winter championships held at the site.

The sports are men's and women's indoor track and field, men's and women's swimming and diving and wrestling.

The Festival will be held at the CrossPlex, which has hosted the indoor track and field championships in the past.

Approximately 250 teams will be represented in the competition.

There will be opening and closing ceremonies, an athlete social lounge where the athletes can mingle and community engagement activities are scheduled.

Community activities include interaction with local youth groups such as the Boys and Girls Clubs, visits to a veterans hospital and elementary schools and a visit to the Freedom Center, an after-school care facility.

The NCAA will also donate computer equipment to various groups in the Birmingham community to further support educational efforts.

The Division II Festival is the only one of its kind in the NCAA. This is the third winter festival and the 10th festival overall.

Along with the opening ceremonies, the NCAA will announce the festival's five Elite 90 recipients. The award is presented in each NCAA sport to the athlete who is competing at the championship finals site and has the highest grade point average.

The last winter festival in Birmingham was in 2013.

Seedings were determined by the teams’ final finish in regular-season and in the case of ties, a tiebreaker system was employed.

During the season, the Javelina men and West Texas split their series. The Buffs took an 80-65 victory in Canyon and the Javelinas recently downed the West Texans, 76-59, in Kingsville.

Duane Wright, 6-2 senior guard/forward from Alexandria, La., tops the Javelina scoring with a 12.1 average. Trey Sumpter, 6-6 junior guard/forward from Birmingham, Ala., averages 10.7 points a game and leads the team in rebounding with a 5.2 average.

West Texas closed its regulation season with a three-game winning streak and is 24-7 overall.

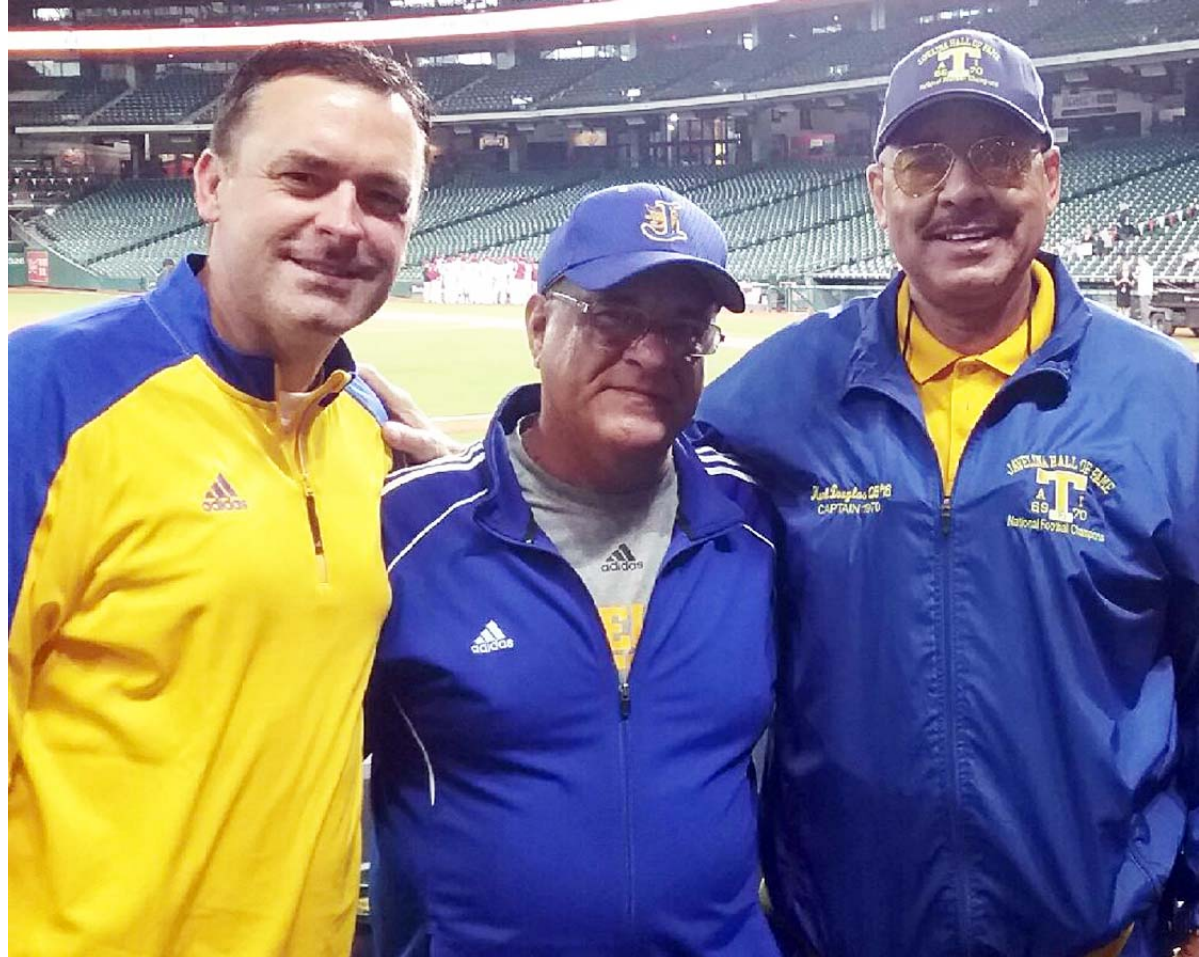
